We look forward to welcoming alumni back to campus for a memorable evening full of celebration and camaraderie. Stay tuned for more details as we continue to finalize plans!

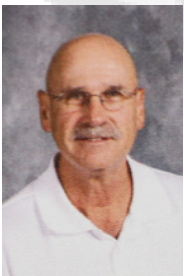
Winter Homecoming takes place on Friday, January 30. The night will feature all Varsity Basketball. With the girls team kicking off the night, and the boys team closing.

SCS has a long tradition of excellence, which has been built through the dedication, talent, and leadership of its students, alumni, and employees. The inaugural class includes 11 individuals who have inspired generations both in the classroom and in the community. These individuals have made a difference and left their mark on Sheridan. Their passion and commitment to everything Sheridan reflects what it means to be a Blackhawk.

The class will be formally inducted during the Hardwood Homecoming double-header game on Friday, January 30th. Along with the other numerous festivities throughout the week, these individuals will be honored for their achievements and lasting impact on Sheridan Community Schools. Please join in on the festivities as these remarkable individuals are recognized and celebrated for their dedication to the Sheridan Blackhawks!

**1. Randy Brimberry** – Randy Brimberry dedicated his career to Sheridan Community Schools as a teacher and coach, shaping the academic and athletic success of countless students. Known for his integrity, positivity, and mentorship, he influenced generations both in the classroom and on the field, helping define the Blackhawk spirit. Even in retirement, Randy continues to support Sheridan, attending events and encouraging students, embodying a lifelong commitment to the community.



**2. Sharon Brimberry** – Sharon Brimberry devoted many years to Sheridan Community Schools as a Business Teacher and Class Sponsor, creating a classroom that combined high expectations with engaging learning. Remembered for her passion and care for students, she positively impacted countless lives. Even in retirement, Sharon continues to support the district through leadership roles on the Education Foundation Board, Sheridan Main Street, and the Jeep Invasion Committee, raising significant funds for the schools.



3. **Al Youmans** – Al Youmans devoted more than 30 years to education as a teacher, counselor, principal, and coach. While at Sheridan, he was a visionary leader by helping to establish the Honors Program, launching the Outstanding Alumnus Award, and strengthening community connections through the Parent Advisory Committee. Al earned multiple regional and state administrative honors and remained deeply involved in school and community life even in retirement through Rotary, his church, and alumni outreach.

4. **Larry “Bud” Wright** – Larry “Bud” Wright is a legendary Indiana high school football coach and the longtime leader of the Sheridan Blackhawks. Over 60 seasons of coaching, with 59 at Sheridan, he became the winningest coach in Indiana history with 457 career victories as of 2024. Wright led Sheridan to nine IHSAA state championships and numerous postseason titles, building one of the state’s most respected programs. He was inducted into the Indiana High School Football Coaches Hall of Fame in 2002 and remains remembered not only for his success on the field but for his lasting impact as a mentor, leader, and symbol of Sheridan pride.

5. **Dr. Paul Waitt** – Dr. Paul Waitt devoted his life to medicine, education, and service to the Sheridan community. After attending Purdue University and Indiana University, he practiced as both a general physician and a general surgeon for nearly four decades, serving Riverview and Tipton Hospitals. A respected Fellow of the College of Surgeons, he also gave generously of his time as team physician for Sheridan athletics, a volunteer in Vietnam, and a longtime School Board member during the construction of the new high school. Dr. Waitt’s legacy reflects his great pride in Sheridan and his commitment to the community he called home.

6. **John Perrine** – John, a member of the Class of 2000, has built a distinguished career in public service as an Indiana State Police officer. He has made a lasting impact on Sheridan through safety trainings, committee leadership, and dedicated support for Sheridan Community Schools, helping ensure a safe and thriving learning environment. As a school board member and longtime coach for high school girls’ basketball and the Sheridan Community Recreation League, John has positively shaped the lives of countless students and athletes.

7. **Karen (Kinkaid) Christian** – Karen Christian devoted her career to serving Sheridan’s youngest learners as an early childhood educator. She founded Small Blessings Preschool and later brought it into Sheridan Community Schools, helping build the strong early learning program that exists today. Known for her commitment to children’s academic, social, and emotional growth, as well as her support of families and mentorship of fellow educators, Karen’s influence has shaped generations.

8. **Kenneth Biddle** – Kenneth Biddle was a lifelong agriculturalist, entrepreneur, and community leader whose vision helped shape Sheridan’s growth. He founded Biddle Precision Components in 1939 and later moved the business to Sheridan, contributing significantly to the town’s economic and industrial development. His legacy extends beyond business through the establishment of the Sheridan Airport, generous philanthropy via the Biddle Memorial Foundation, and support for preserving local history.

9. **Kent Harris** – Kent Harris devoted his entire career to Sheridan Community Schools, serving in a wide range of roles as an educator, coach, and administrator. His unwavering commitment to students and staff, combined with his positive and encouraging leadership, made him a trusted mentor and guiding presence throughout the district. Always willing to support others and strengthen community connections, Kent’s influence is reflected in the many individuals inspired by his example.

10. **Martha (Richardson) Rocky** – Martha devoted her life to education, service, and the Sheridan community. Teaching for more than 34 years, with 31 of them as a beloved second-grade teacher at Sheridan Community Schools, she became known for her deep love of reading and inspiration to both students and families. In retirement, Martha continued her service through Sheridan First United Methodist Church, supporting preschool programs, community meals, and homebound members.

11. **Mary Alice (Bowen) Godby** – Mary Alice Godby devoted her life to service, care, and community, leaving a lasting legacy at Sheridan Community Schools. She served as Cafeteria Manager and affectionately became known as “Grandma Godby.” She provided much more than just a warm meal; she provided comfort, consistency, and genuine care to generations of students. Her unwavering commitment to Sheridan Schools and the community makes her richly deserving of induction into the Sheridan Blackhawk Wall of Fame.



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## Northern Hamilton County Academy Is Committed To Students

January 13, 2026 – Sheridan Community Schools and Hamilton Heights School Corporation have always been great partners, sharing a common goal of doing what is best for students. Under the leadership of Dr. Dave Mundy and Dr. Derek Arrowood, respectively, the two schools have again teamed up to secure the future of the Northern Hamilton County Academy.

The Northern Hamilton County Academy, or otherwise known as NHCA, was created as an alternative education program for students who face academic, behavioral, or personal challenges that place them at risk of falling behind or leaving school altogether. Students from Sheridan, Hamilton Heights, and Westfield attend this alternative program, which provides a structured, supportive learning environment. At the academy, students work on online coursework, get in-person instruction, job-readiness training, and mentorship. For a lot of students, the NHCA is a second chance to earn their diploma and remain connected to their respective high school.

More recently, changes in Indiana state funding eliminated designated financial support for alternative education programs. This dramatically reduced funding for NHCA and left the academy's future up in the air. But thanks to the support of local businesses, families, foundations, and community leaders, NHCA's funding has been secured.

The NHCA has proven its success and service to students. And because of that, they have benefited from a unique matching opportunity through the Lilly Endowment, which is brought to students through the Hamilton County Community Foundation. That being said, the program has secured approximately \$1 million in funding for the next several years. The funds will allow the NHCA to continue serving students in the individual districts of Hamilton Heights and Sheridan.

The impact of the NHCA is evident in its numbers. Last school year alone, 35 students were enrolled across the three districts, and those students earned a total of 207 academic credits. Ten of the thirteen seniors met graduation requirements, and the remaining three are on track to graduate this year. The year before last also saw strong results. Eleven of the twelve seniors met graduation requirements, and nearly 190 credits were earned.

January 12, 2026 – On Saturday, January 10th, senior Jackson Ter Horst was the overall winner for his division in the White River Valley Tournament of Champions. Throughout the day, Ter Horst bowled five games and was able to enter the single elimination part of the tournament as the number 6 seed. He bowled an average of 142 in the final three games to win the bracket. By winning the bracket, he defeated the number one and two seeds in the semifinal and final head-to-head competition. This outstanding achievement highlights a remarkable first season for the senior student-athlete and a bright future for the Blackhawks' bowling program.



## Sheridan High School Announces New Athletic Director

January 12, 2026 – At Sheridan Community Schools' recent board meeting, they approved the Sheridan High School athletic director, Jared Green. SHS is proud to welcome Green as he brings extensive experience in athletic administration, development, and student-athlete support. He also brings a strong commitment to building programs that serve students, families, and the school community.

Sheridan High School Principal, Rick Davis, shares, "After an extensive search that included many outstanding candidates, Sheridan High School is excited to welcome Mr. Jared Green to the Blackhawk family as our new Athletic Director. Mr. Green's experience, leadership, and vision will help continue to move Sheridan athletics forward with pride and success, while maintaining a strong commitment to the "student" component of our student-athletes."

Green holds a Master's in Sport Administration from Ball State University and a Bachelor's in Sport Marketing and Management from Indiana University. His academic background, along with his professional experience, puts him in a great position to lead and support Sheridan's athletic programs.

Green, most recently, served as Associate Athletic Director for Development at Pepperdine University in Malibu, CA. While there, he oversaw athletic development initiatives, including fundraising, alumni relations, and donor engagement. He supervised the advancement team, managed budgets, and served as the administrator for the baseball team. He also helped raise funds for various projects, including a new basketball arena and upgrades to soccer, baseball, and golf facilities.

Before Pepperdine, Green worked at IU-Indianapolis. While there, he helped guide growth in athletics through fundraising and sponsorship. While there, the athletic department had three record-breaking fundraising years, launched an NIL collective, and established new scholarships to benefit student-athletes. He also served as the administrator for men's soccer, women's volleyball, and women's tennis.

Green's experience also includes roles at Austin Peay State University, the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame, and Ball State University. But it all started when he was a student manager and bullpen catcher for IU Baseball. This gave him a firsthand insight into the student-athlete experience at the collegiate level.

Green shares, "I am truly honored to join the Sheridan family as the next Athletic Director. I look forward to elevating the experiences for each of our student-athletes and teams, retaining and growing participation at the middle and high school, and ensuring that Blackhawk student-athletes are positioned for success academically, athletically, and in life after graduation. My family and I are excited to return to a community we have proudly called home for much of the past four years."

Green and his wife, Ashlynn, are parents to Cali and Jaxon, and the family also includes their dog, Chloe. Outside of school, Green is a fan of Indiana University, the Chicago Cubs, the Indianapolis Colts, and the Indiana Pacers. Sheridan High School looks forward to the leadership that Jared Green will bring to Blackhawk athletics and is excited for the future of its programs.

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## Blackhawk Bowler named to All-Conference

January 7, 2026 – Tuesday, January 6th, freshman Sophia Hufferd was named to the White River Valley All-Conference Team. This earns her one of only seven spots that are awarded to bowlers across the conference. Hufferd led the Blackhawks this season with an impressive 188 average, which ranks as the second-highest average in the conference. Her performance also set a new school record, making it the highest bowling average in school history. This outstanding achievement highlights a remarkable freshman season and a bright future for the Blackhawks' bowling program.

## Sheridan Youth Assistance Program (SYAP) takes care of their community!

December 17, 2025 – Sheridan Youth Assistance Program (SYAP), Mama's Cupboard, and the Sunflower Pantry of Sheridan United Methodist Church work together to support Sheridan families during the holiday season.

Sheridan families with children 18 and under in their households and senior citizen households may apply for the program and request assistance for Thanksgiving and Christmas. Through this program, over 120 households received food to make a Thanksgiving meal that was distributed on November 22. From December 6-13, over 130 households received gifts, hygiene products, homemade goodies, and food gift cards for their Christmas and holiday celebrations in December.

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## Sheridan High School Cafeteria Staff and Nutrition Services Featured on a K-12 Food Rescue Podcast

December 17, 2025 – Sheridan Community School continues to stay committed to supporting students and reducing food waste. This commitment was recently highlighted in a “K–12 Food Rescue: A Food Waste Solution Podcast”, hosted by Food Rescue President John Williamson. The episode aired on December 4 and is available on Spotify. It is titled “Sheridan, Indiana: K–12 Food Rescue Nutrition Service Leader Sarah Freeland”. Sarah Freeland, the Nutrition Services Site Manager at Sheridan High School, was featured. The podcast episode discusses how SCS is implementing strategies to minimize food waste while still serving and feeding students effectively.

Like many schools, not every student will eat everything on their tray. Sheridan Nutrition Services recognized this waste that was occurring every day. So, Nancy Mosna, Food and Nutrition Director at SCS, and Sarah Freeland teamed up to develop multiple different approaches to reduce and minimize food waste, while supporting the community. One of the most visible strategies was to create a shared space in the cafeteria where students can place sealed, uneaten food items instead of throwing them away. These items are then later offered to students who may be hungry throughout the day, at a free cost, of course.

Freeland shared on the podcast that on average, a dozen or more items are shared every day. This includes fruits, vegetables, juice boxes, frozen fruits, and packaged items such as granola bars. Around the cafeteria, there are clear signs that explain which items can be shared and emphasize that only sealed items should be placed in the space.

But, Sheridan doesn't stop at that! At the end of the school year, any produce or food items that may expire over the summer are donated to Mama's Cupboard, a local nonprofit organization that focuses on helping community members in need. This donation ensures that the food benefits local families instead of going to waste. Another way that SCS is reducing food waste is by using their computer systems to monitor daily attendance so that food production is made accordingly. This allows cafeteria staff to adjust meals and reduce overproduction.

At SCS, Sarah Freeland, along with Nancy Mosna and the entire cafeteria staff, cares for the students at Sheridan. This year, Sheridan has been testing a community garden that is located right on Sheridan High School grounds, in the courtyard. In the future, they plan to fully integrate the fresh produce created in this garden into the cafeteria.

Sheridan Community Schools is making intentional efforts to help prevent food waste. Through these simple actions, the results will be huge and have a meaningful and lasting impact on those who call Sheridan home.



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## Sheridan High School Students Lead Launch of Bowling Team

December 17, 2025 – Sheridan High School is excited to share the successful launch of its newest athletic team: Bowling. The program was completely born out of student interest, community and staff support, and a shared commitment to ensuring that every student has the opportunity to excel.

The team was formed after it became clear that a highly accomplished young bowler at SHS was being excluded from high school competition due to participation rules based on having a team. Rather than allowing the student to miss out on an awesome opportunity to thrive, SCS Superintendent Dave Mundy led the charge to get a team created for this and all students.

Mundy shared, “As superintendent, we never want to see our students lose out on chances to excel...especially when it’s something we can help change. This has been an amazing adventure this year, and we have already seen tremendous success. I am incredibly proud that this was a student initiative. It’s exactly what makes SCS so special.”

After an announcement was sent out to gauge interest and support from Mr. Rick Davis, SHS principal, within 24 hours a team had been created. The result was the immediate formation of the SHS Bowling Team. The team now competes in girls' varsity competition and boys' junior varsity.

One of the most remarkable aspects of the team is that the majority of the student-athletes have never bowled before, let alone competed in a bowling event. That being said, enthusiasm and teamwork have been a driver for the group. Freshman, Sophia Hufferd, helped lead the charge of students. She shared, “It has been a great season even though we joined later in the season. All of us have so much fun. Even at practice!”

Adding experience and leadership to the ongoing effort, longtime high school bowling coach, Jimmy Trexler, came out of retirement to coach the Blackhawks. His guidance has helped tremendously as the team battles through its first season.

Thanks to generous donations, the team was also able to secure bowling balls, shirts, and bags within days. Without the community and administrative support, this team would not have been able to get off the ground. So, it is thanks to them that the bowling team can be as competitive as it is.

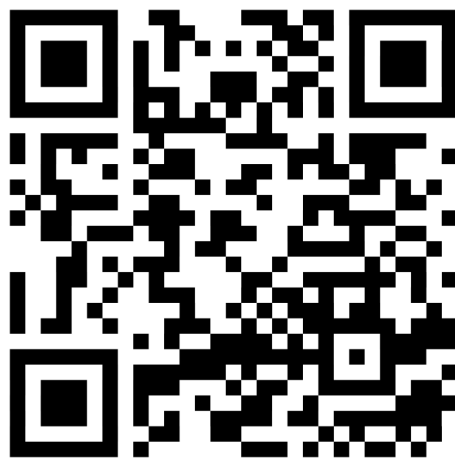
